




Sanborn Map 1930


1984 Property Plat of Survey




Floor plans of the Rollin Furbeck House.




Recreated floor plans of the original layout of the Rollin Furbeck House. Frank Lloyd Wright's original drawings have not been located.

Memorandum for Mr. Bartels From Mr. Brown

RE: Occupancy of residence at 515 Fair Daks Avenue

Judge Barrett requested that I be present in the Court room on March 2, 1950, to act as an observer in a trial involving an assult case occurring on March 17, 1956.

Two women were involved in this assult usse, both testified that they were paying roomers in the building located at the above address. They testified that they occupied and paid for rooms from September, 1955 to March, 1956, and that other rooms werefoccupied on the second and third floors by displaced persons from Greece, and a brother of Mrs. Sharris had a room on the third floor. They also testified, under oath, that the owner had two male roomers on the second floor, occupying rooms temporarily.

The witnesses who appeared for Mrs. Sharris included her brother, mother, father and a roomer whom Mrs. Sharris declared, under oath, is a friend and pays no rent. She stated that as soon as he secures employment and is in a position to pay rent, he will be requested to leave.

Mrs. Sharris who is president of a Greek Rehabilitation Organization stated that she sometimes houses people on a temporary basis---never more than two people.

There was no substantial proof offered by the witnesses to substantiate any of the statements they had made under oath.

I was called as a mitness to reveal whatever information I had in order to clear up the question of the occupancy of this building. I stated that a number of inspections had been made at various times, and the owner declared that the people who were living in this building were related to her.

I suggested to the Judge that he secure the names of the occupants of this residence at the present time so that they could be subpossed as witnesses by the court. The Judge was rejuctant to do this.


FURBECK, WARREN F .- Born in Schenectady county, New York, in 1848, and comes from Revolutionary stock-His great grandfather was a Hesslan, and at the time of the Revolution, while purroing his studies at college, was drafted and sold into the service of King George to fight the colonists. He was taken a prisoner soon after, however, joined the Americans, and expoused the cause of the colonists, and until the close of the war fought for the country of his adoption. The parents of the subject were John H. and Adeline Sophia Furbeck, both of whom were born in New York. He came to Chicago with his parents in 1861, finished his education in the public schools and at the age of fifteen years started in life for himself. His first employment was in the First National Bank which, at the time, occupied a room about twenty feet square, and furnished work for five clerks. In 1966 he removed with his parents to Oak Park, where he now resides. He remained with the First National Bank until 1882, lilling various responsible positions, and

at the time it was planning to enter in present quarters accepted the position of cashier in the banking house of Charles T. Yerkes. He subsequently became Mr. Yerkee' private occretary, following him from banking to railroading, and in 1889 was elected view-president of the North Chicago Street Railroad Company, which office he now holds. He was married in 1821 to Miss Sophia E. Whaples, of Ook Park, a daughter of one of the earliest settlers of that suburb, and has five boys living. He is a member of the Ook Park Congregational church, having united with it at the age of seventeen, and has lived at Oak Park nearly 27 years. His habits are domestic, and he cares very little for club or society life. Home is his realm, and he enjoys its sweet influences with the deepest sest,

woodman C. Hamilton, ranked among the most progressive business men of Found du Lar, was born in Lyme, Gravitan county, N. H., February, 1834. He was educated at St. Johnsbury needemy, and was graduated therefrom at the age of 18 years. In 1855, having reached his majority, he came to Wisconsin and settled in Fond du Lac. He was soon joined by his brother Irenus K., and together they built a sawnill which they operated successfully until 1867, when it was sold. In 1866 they began to acquire pine lands on the Menomonice river, and in conjunction with A. C. Merryman formed the firm of Hamilton, Merryman formed the firm of Hamilton, Merryman formed the firm built at large mill at Marinette in 1867, which has been in prosperous joperation ever since. The plant has been vested in a stock sompany known as the Hamilton-Merryman Co. of which W. C. Hamilton had been vice-president since its organization.

Mr. Hamilton was president of the Hamilton-Merryman Mining company, which owns valuable iron mines in northern Michigan. He was also interested in other valuable real estate in Wisconsin and in Chicago.

The cause of education has greatly occupied Mr. Hamilton's attention, and for many years he had been deeply interested in the purpose and spirit and in the good work of Ripon college. For several years he was vice-president of that cor-Woodman C. Hamilton, ranked among

good work of Ripon college. For several years he was vice-president of that corporation, and a member of the executive committee. In his usual quiet way, and with marked generosity, he had many times rendered special assistance to young men and women who had entered the struggle for an education.

On February 16, 1858, at Brooklyn, N. Y. Mr. Hamilton was married to Miss Mary Taylor Weed, a native of Darien, Conn., and to this union have been born five sons. In politics he was a Republican, and had held several local offices, such as alderman, president of the board of education and chairman of the board of public works.













1 GROUP COUNTER

- · Ensure that all guests have a wristband or lanyard pass
- · Count out groups of 8 people

INCLUDE FAST PASS GUESTS IN THE FIRST AVAILABLE GROUP.

- · Do not break up groups or families traveling together
- · Remind guests as needed:
 - o No food or beverage is allowed in the house
 - Backpacks or large bags must be checked if they are larger than the allowed 12"x12" size. Guests may bring tagged bags (that fit within limits) into the house throughout the day
 - o No photography is allowed beyond the designated sign
 - o No children under 12 are permitted to tour the property
 - o High heels must be carried when in the house
 - o Silence phones as a courtesy to everyone
- When signaled by Station 4 (Exterior/Sidewalk), invite the group to move forward

NOTE FOR ALL SPEAKING STATIONS

- · Use SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION if:
 - o The next station is not yet available for guests, or
- Your House Captain instructs you to use it regularly.
- If your House Captain asks you to drop content to improve the flow of the tour:
 - o Be subtle and don't signal to guests the content change.
 - o Begin by skipping any SUPPLEMENTAL bullets (if in use).
 - Eliminate bullets with a dash, as directed by your Captain.

2 BAG CHECK # 1

- Watch for backpacks, large bags, strollers, shopping bags, and umbrellas as guests prepare to enter the home
- Only small bags and purses that fit within the bag sizer (12" x 12") and are tagged will be allowed inside
 - In early shifts, tag bags that are smaller than the 12" x 12" limit.
 Guests may bring tagged bags into houses throughout the day
 - If guests challenge the need to check bags, tell them "We are trying to be consistent across all houses, and we promised the homeowner that we'd be extra careful about managing bags."
- . Provide a numbered clothespin for each article to be checked
- If checked items are to be moved, let guests know where they can be picked up
- . In the event of rain, let guests know how umbrellas will be handled
- . Food and drinks must be stored in a bag in order to be checked

3 BAG CHECK # 2

- . Coordinate with Bag Check #1
- · Organize and monitor all checked bags
- As guests exit the house, collect the numbered clothespins, check them against clothespins on the checked bags and return the appropriate checked items

NEVER LEAVE BAGS UNATTENDED

4 EXTERIOR/SIDEWALK

FRANK LLOYD WRIGHT'S TRANSITIONAL PERIOD

- · Wright commissioned to design the house in spring 1897
- · Wright had started independent practice just 4 years earlier
 - He would move away from details we see on the Furbeck House as he developed Prairie style, including:
 - Louis Sullivan influenced columns
 - Brick corbelling
 - Buttress-like corners
 - Dentil molding
 - o Elements of Prairie style are incorporated in the design
 - Low pitched hip roof
 - Wide overhanging eaves
 - Brick extending up to the bottom of second floor windows, topped by string course of limestone
- . There are many leaded glass light fixtures throughout the house
 - o None original, commissioned by recent owners
 - Some are based on fixtures designed by Wright for other buildings
 - First fixture you will see is on the ceiling of the front porch as you enter the house

FURBECKS

- Rollin Furbeck had just married Elizabeth Allen
- The Europecks moved into the house in the fall of 1897
 - o Their daughter Edith was born soon after
 - o They lived in the house for only 13 months
 - The Europecks moved to New York where Rollin worked as a stock broker

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION

- o The large, single pane, picture window unusual for Wright
 - Believed to be one of the first used in any residence
- o Note the 8-pointed star columns supporting the porch roof
- Wright also designed a house for Wright's brother George at about the same time
- Rollin's uncle, Judson Whaples, lived next door at 509 Fair Oaks
- Both sides of Rollin's family, the Furbecks and the Whaples, were very early settlers in Oak Park

LOGISTICS

- When signaled by Station 5 (Front Porch), wrap up your interpretation and invite the group to move forward
 - o Remind guests to watch their step on steps to porch

FRONT PORCH

RESPONSIBILITIES AND LOGISTICS

- When signaled by Station 6 (Living Room), open door and send next group in. Signal Station 4 (Architecture/Sidewalk) to send group forward
 - Remind guests to watch their step as they step across the threshold



6 LIVING ROOM

INTERIOR FEATURES

- Similar to Wright's own home, this house has a circulating floor plan
 - o Access to each room continues from the adjoining room
 - o Large openings between primary spaces, no doors
- · Large single-pane window provides light and view of street
 - Elevation above sidewalk level provides privacy
 - o Similar large window in the rear of the Dining Room
 - o Other windows double-hung, large lower pane for better view
 - Wright transitioned to casement windows in Prairie houses
- · Focal point, fireplace surrounded by inglenook, typical for Wright
- Uniquely, constructed of pre-cast concrete, travertine marble hearth

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION

- o Wood molding on ceiling frames the space
- Inset from corners creates illusion of higher ceiling
- Much of the artwork in the house was painted by the current homeowner's mother, an accomplished artist

LOGISTICS

- When signaled by Station 7 (Stairmaster 1st Floor), send the group forward and signal Station 5 (Front Porch) to send next group
- Advise guests they will be seeing the 2nd and 3nd floors. If they don't want to climb stairs, move to hallway and join next group at Station 14 (Kitchen)
- Tell guests to look for spindle screen on left side of stairs, a feature used often by Wright, as they go up

7 STAIRMASTER, 1ST FLOOR

RESPONSIBILITIES AND LOGISTICS

- This is a key logistics station. Your role is to manage traffic between the living room, groups going up the stairs, groups coming down the stairs
- Wait for signal by Station 8 (2nd Floor Landing), before sending next group up the stairs
- · Advise guests to watch their step and use handrails
- When groups are descending stairs, direct them to their left and head to Station 14 (Kitchen). This group has right-of-way over a new group coming from the Living Room
- Do not let visitors wait on the stairs, hold them in the mezzanine as necessary until groups descending are off the stairs



8 2ND FLOOR LANDING

RESPONSIBILITIES AND LOGISTICS

- This is a key logistics station. Your role is to manage traffic between groups coming up the stairs, groups coming down from the third floor and descending the stairs to the kitchen
- As groups start to exit Station 9 (Guest Bedroom) signal Station 7 (Stairmaster 1st Floor) to send group up
- If necessary, hold groups coming down from 3rd floor in the 2rd floor hallway until the ascending group enters the Station 9 (Guest Bedroom) and then send group down the stairs
- · Advise guests descending to watch their step and use handrails
- . Make sure that no visitors are standing and waiting on the stairs



GUEST BEDROOM

ROOM FEATURES

- . Only room on this floor unchanged from original design
- · Original windows and fir wood flooring
- · Coved ceilings
- · Two closets
- Bathroom, now Jack & Jill, was originally private to this bedroom
- Office on the opposite side of the bathroom was originally the changing room and closet of the Primary Bedroom

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION

- · Door on back wall leads to small room
 - Originally an open space under cantilevered end of a third-floor room (photos on Research Boards)

LOGISTICS

 When signaled by Station 10 (Stairmaster 2nd floor) wrap up interpretation and send group through the bathroom into office

10 STAIRMASTER 2ND FLOOR

RESPONSIBILITIES AND LOGISTICS

- This is a key logistics station. Your role is to manage traffic between groups coming from the office, groups leaving the Primary Bedroom, and groups going up and coming down from the third floor
- As group from 3rd floor is descending stairs, direct them toward Station 8 (2rd Floor Landing)
- . Signal Station 11 (Primary Bedroom) to send group forward
- Once group from Primary Bedroom is ascending stairs, walk into office and signal Station 9 (Guest Bedroom) to send group forward
- If necessary, hold groups in Primary Bedroom or office. Groups descending stairs have priority
- · Advise guests descending to watch their step and use handrails
- · Make sure that no visitors are standing and waiting on the stairs



11 PRIMARY BEDROOM

ROOM FEATURES

- Suggest that guests glance into the bathroom door as you tell them about the room
- Note the view from the window through the columns that were seen from the front of the house
- . This room was originally a large bathroom
- . It opened to a small bedroom located where the bathroom is now
- It also opened to the original Primary Bedroom on the opposite side of the room
 - The original Primary Bedroom, along with a changing room and closet, ran along the entire south side of house
 - That space now contains a walk-in closet, as well as the office you just walked through

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION

- Current homeowners reconfigured the Primary Bedroom space to how you see it today
- The columns outside the windows are decorative, not load bearing.
 The tops or capitals had deteriorated and in the 1990s, molds were made to create replacement replicas

LOGISTICS

- When signaled by Station 10 (Stairmaster 2nd Floor), wrap up interpretation and send group forward to go to 3nd floor
- Be sure that Station 10 knows when you are ready for another group to enter the bedroom

12 STAIRMASTER 3RD FLOOR

RESPONSIBILITIES AND LOGISTICS

- Coordinate with Station 10 (Stairmaster 2nd Floor) to bring groups up to the third floor and to return those groups to the second floor
- As a group ascends the stairs, direct them down the hall to Station 13 (Office)
- When group exits Station 13 (Office) direct them into 3rd floor bedroom and have them wait until next group ascends the stairs into the office. Suggest that they take turns glancing out the back window
- . Once stairs are clear, send group from bedroom down the stairs
- · Signal Station 13 (Office) to send group forward
- · Do not allow groups to wait on the stairs



13 OFFICE

ROOM FEATURES

- The third floor was originally two bedrooms and a bathroom for servants
- Current homeowners converted this into an office
- · Note the view of the columns through the front windows

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION

- 13 different families have lived in the house since the Furbecks left
 - Many for just a few years
 - Several of the homeowners during early years did have live-in servants
 - The owner from the mid-1950s to mid-1980s was from Greece and housed recent Greek immigrants and also rented rooms
 - The current and previous owners have extensively restored and renovated the house

LOGISTICS

 When signaled by Station 12 (Stairmaster 3rd Floor) send group forward



14 KITCHEN

ROOM FEATURES

- Direct guests to move into the room and circle around to the back of the island
- · This space was originally three rooms
 - Divided where you now see plaster beams running along the ceiling above the island and where the wood column stands
 - A partial wall was adjacent to the door the group just entered, separating a smaller kitchen from the sitting area
 - The back wall of the house was where that wood column stands
 - An open porch extended across the back of the space
- . The current homeowners completely remodeled this space
 - o The room was expanded into the former back porch
 - The large island was installed with pendant lamps inspired by the "Butterfly Lamps" designed by Frank Lloyd Wright for the Dana-Thomas House in Springfield, IL

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION

- The remodeled kitchen and the current homeowners were featured on an episode of the HGTV "New Spaces" show
- Backsplash tiles were made by Motawi Tiles in Ann Arbor, MI
- · Cabinets are cherry wood and floors are maple

LOGISTICS

- When signaled by Station 15 (Dining Room) wrap up interpretation and send group forward
- If group from 3rd floor enters kitchen as you complete interpretation, hold them in sitting area until group in kitchen exits for Station 15 (Dining Room). Direct guests to move into the room and circle around to the back of the island



15 DINING ROOM

ROOM FEATURES

- In 1907, the room was enlarged by moving the rear wall back several feet
 - The large single-pane window is similar to the one in the front of the house
- The art glass windows flanking the large pane on the back wall are the only art glass windows in the house.
 - The one on the right is original from the 1907 remodeling. The other is a replica
- The light fixture above the main table was custom made for the previous owners to match the design of these windows

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION

- The current owners installed the wet bar with cabinet doors matching the art glass windows
- The dining room table was custom made for the current owners

LOGISTICS

- . When signaled by Station 16 (Porch) send the group forward
- · Signal to Station 14 (Kitchen) that you are ready for the next group



16 PORCH

ROOM FEATURES

- This space was originally a porte cochere ("port co-share"), or covered shelter over the driveway
- In the 1950s, the space was enclosed and the area beneath excavated for apartments in the basement
- The current homeowners completely remodeled, insulated and heated the space to create a four-season den
 - When you exit, notice the back of the house is informal as compared to the formal front of house

LOGISTICS

- . Open the back door and direct the guests out to the deck
- · Remind guests to watch their step
- Ask guests to sign the Guest Book on the deck and stop at the Research Boards
- Direct guests to follow the signs to exit around the north side of the house and pick up any checked bags






